The place

Central Australia and its largest town, Alice Springs, is the spiritual and physical heart of Australia.

Located in the centre of Australia, it is a unique and captivating place.

Alice Springs (or *Mparntwe* in Arrernte language) is the third-largest town in the Northern Territory, with a population of approximately 33,000 people. The town is halfway between Darwin and Adelaide, about 1,500 km each away.

The CBD is filled with a variety of shops and supermarkets including clothing, art, camping, lifestyle and more. You can find everything you need in the town centre.

A short walk from the CBD is the iconic Todd River, a dry riverbed that can flow when the season's first rainfall hits. You are considered a true local when you have seen the Todd flow three times.

The town is surrounded by stunning natural beauty, including the MacDonnell Ranges and the Red Centre Desert. About 450kms down the road is

Uluru, a large sandstone rock formation that is a spectacular sight any time of the year.

Weather

In Central Australia you get a taste of all four seasons, with warm summer days contrasted against chilly sub-zero winter nights.

Alice Springs experiences long, dry periods followed by spectacular storms and rainfall. Locals enjoy watching as the rainfall brings the region to life with lush grasses and an abundance of wildflowers in their bloom.

Temperatures in Alice Springs can vary, with an average maximum in summer of 35.6 °C and an average minimum in winter of 5.1 °C

Transport

Alice Springs Airport is 17 km from the town centre and offers flights to major Australian capitals as well as regular flights to regional hubs - Tennant Creek and Katherine. Private charter services are available for remote travel.

Great Southern Railways offers rail journeys on the Ghan through the Northern Territory. These stop in Alice Springs on route from Adelaide to Darwin.

Travelling to the Northern Territory by bus is easy and affordable. Major coach and tour companies run coach services between transport hubs in the Territory and destinations in Western Australia, South Australia and Queensland.

There is a regular bush bus service connecting Alice Springs with remote townships and travelling North to Tennant Creek and Katherine.

Parking is generally ample and free in Alice Springs with some restricted and paid parking around major facilities.

Well-maintained, sealed highways provide the most direct routes between the Northern Territory from cities in South Australia, Queensland and Western Australia. There's plenty to explore in the region by regular car or campervan, as well as by 4WD.

The people

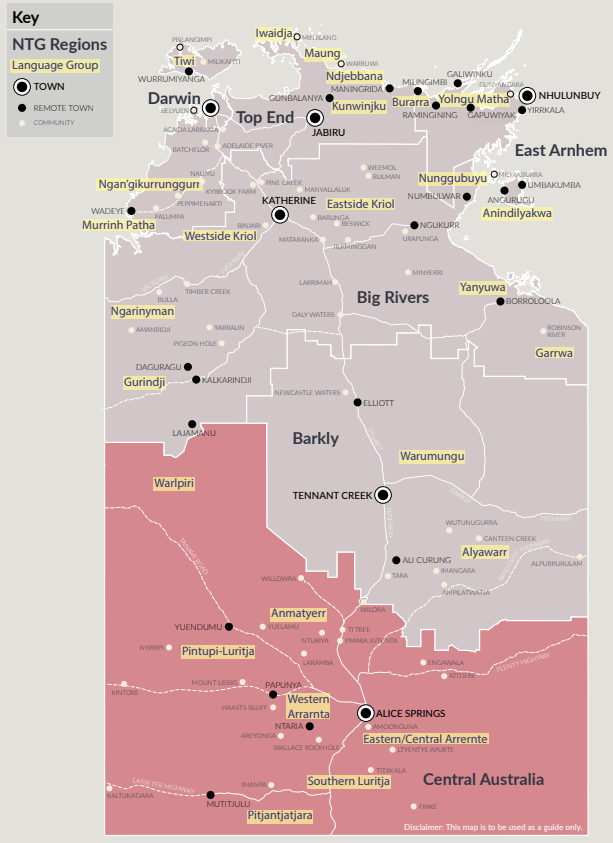

Dental services

Children can visit any of the school-based dental clinics from age 0, and until they finish primary school (year 6). Once your child starts year 7, they must visit one of the community dental clinics.

You can get free public dental services in the Northern Territory if you meet one of the following criteria:

- under 18 years old, still in school and don't work full time
- part of the Australian Government's cleft lip and cleft palate scheme, for more information go to Services Australia website
- Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card
- Centrelink Health Care Card
- live more than 100 km away from the nearest dental service in a remote area, and you need emergency dental care but don't have access to private dental services, you can receive care from the visiting dental team.

To receive free orthodontic services, in addition to the above, you must also meet all of the following:

- holder or dependant of a Health Care Card or Pension Concession Card
- meet strict clinical criteria based on clinical assessment of a public orthodontist or dentist
- your orthodontic treatment will be completed by the age of 18.

Aged Care

The aged care assessment program provides support to eligible people who need Australian Government services such as:

- residential aged care or respite
- home care packages, and
- transition care program for older people after a hospital stay.

To access this program, you must be Aboriginal and 50 years old and over, or non-Aboriginal and 65 years old and over.

Schools and daycare

A range of primary, secondary and tertiary education options as well as childcare facilities are available in Alice Springs.

School term and holiday dates differ to other States with a longer mid-year break of 3 weeks.

There are 4 terms in the school year and, most government schools follow the same term dates with the exception of some remote schools.

School term dates are available here: nt.gov.au/learning/primary-and-secondary-students/school-term-dates-in-nt.

If your child attends a [non-government school](#), check the term dates with the school.

Territory schools generally hold classes between 8am and 3pm. All Government schools are co-educational.

In the Northern Territory there are three stages of schooling which are:

- Primary - transition to Year 6
- Middle - Year 7 to Year 9
- Senior - Year 10 to Year 12.

Alice Springs has a range of childcares facilities, ranging from family day care to long day care centres.

If enrolling in preschool you must also complete the supplementary preschool enrolment form.

Arts and Culture

With deep spiritual origins dating back more than 30,000 years Alice Springs has an abundance of rich culture and history.

Boasting a significant cultural precinct offering a 500 seat theatre, art galleries, museums and craft centres – Alice Springs and Central Australia is an art lover's paradise. With ancient rock art, international contemporary artists, award winning street art or local arts and crafts, there is something for everyone.

The Town Council offers a pocket-size printed map for locating an array of murals, sculptures, decorative tiles and functional artworks, along with artist information. The map is freely available from the Civic Centre, Visitor Information Centre, and many tourist venues around town. Over 40 public artworks are within the Todd Mall and CBD area alone, and within easy walking distance from each other.

Araluen Arts Centre in Alice Springs operates as the visual art and performance hub of Central Australia. It presents an annual program of exhibitions, performances, and film. Known as the keeping place of stories, Araluen holds some of the most significant works of art in Central Australia and brings to the stage world class performances from across the nation.

Central Craft is a not-for-profit membership-based organisation located at the Araluen Cultural Precinct that nurtures and promotes craft and design practice in Central Australia. With well-equipped studios, a workshop program, a retail outlet and a gallery space for established and emerging craftspeople.

The Outback Way Outdoor Gallery is an exciting and original concept that takes art out of traditional gallery spaces and into the wide red landscape of the Eastern MacDonnell Ranges on the Plenty Highway; located between 150 – 260kms from Alice Springs.

Experience all that Central Australia has to offer by adding Aboriginal rock art sites to your itinerary. Many have signage that explains the history, cultural and spiritual interpretations of the rock carvings.

The Field of Light in Uluru is a bucket list experience for everyone who visits the region and each year.

Sports

All full range of grass roots sport is offered in Alice Springs with excellent community facilities for all ages.

The Alice Springs golf course is rated one of the top ten desert courses in the world with its grass fairways and greens.

[The Alice Springs Aquatic & Leisure Centre](#) is a state-of-the-art facility featuring:

- Outdoor 50 metre pool
- Outdoor splash pad
- Outdoor learn to swim pool
- Indoor 8 lane, 25 metre heated swimming lap pool
- Indoor 20 metre pool with beach entry, disabled ramp access, indoor spa, lazy river and a 4 lane learn-to-swim section
- Two fun water slides – a single loop and a double loop
- Hoist and wet chair for indoor pool access

Sporting clubs

Alice Springs hosts at least one round of the AFL each year. The Central Australian Football League has 10 x Teams competing during the dry season. AFL participation is offered from Auskick up to senior social levels. For more information visit aflnt.com.au/cafl

Events

Motor sports are big in Central Australia. The Alice Springs Inland Dragway motor sports complex

located 13 km (8.1 mi) south of Alice Springs is the only purpose-built quarter mile drag racing venue in regional Australia.

The region hosts the world famous, Finke Desert Race, Australia's biggest Off-Road Race as well as Red CentreNATS which is an automotive lifestyle festival with Burnout competitions and drag racing events. The Camel Cup is an annual camel racing festival held in Alice Springs.

Other well-known events include Alice Springs Beanie Festival, Henley on Todd, Desert Mob, Partjima: A Festival in Light, fabAlice and more. Shopping

Most shops are located in the town's Central Business District (CBD) including the Yeperenye Shopping Centre, Alice Plaza and Todd Mall. Each within easy walking distance of each other. You can shop for a variety of things from fashion, home wear, sporting goods, lifestyle and more.

Local attractions

The MacDonnell Ranges and stunning surrounding scenery is a photographers and artists dreamscape.

An exceptional exercise arena for nature lovers with mountain bike tracks, runners trails, bush tracks and horse-riding tracks.

With very little light pollution even some of the faintest star constellations stars become visible after the sun has set. Earth Sanctuary the best place in Alice Springs to learn about the night skies in a semi-formal environment but there are heaps of vantage points across the town for stargazing.

Day trips to Alice Springs and surrounds made possible by several tour companies with trips to the East and West MacDonnell Ranges and Uluru available.

In Alice Springs you can walk along the Todd River, around the Telegraph Station, to the Desert Park and further on to Simpsons Gap, and into the Olive Pink Botanic Gardens. For a fun and informative way to get to know Alice Springs you can join a walking tour.

The Larapinta Trail is one of the best hikes in the area surrounding Alice Springs. Starting at the Telegraph Station head west 231km along the West MacDonnell Ranges. There are twelve sections to be completed as a multiday hike or in individual sections. Popular options here.

There are also hiking trails located in the East MacDonnell Ranges at Trephina Gorge and between Emily and Jessie Gap. Nature walks offering unparalleled views of the Central Australian desert and the local flora and fauna unique to the region.

For outdoor enthusiasts cycling and mountain biking are available in the areas surrounding Alice Springs. My Ride and Red Centre Adventures a good starting point for cycling enthusiasts. Renting bikes and providing advice on trails of the area. Trails are present on the East and West sides of Alice Springs. East-side trails are gentle suitable for intermediate to advanced riders. Trails on the West side of town are for the advanced only. Cycling around Alice Springs itself also popular as there are no hills to navigate.

In case you were wondering. Yes you can swim in the desert. Local swimming spots include Ellery Creek Big Hole, Ormiston Gorge, Redbank Gorge and Glen Helen Gorge. Ellery Creek being the closest just 90kms from Alice.

Housing and suburbs

The suburbs include large blocks of land and single-storey homes. Many families are drawn to the area due to the convenience of schools, parks and activities for the kids. In recent years units have become more common due to the influx of singles to the area seeking opportunity and adventure.

Renting

The average rental price for a unit in Alice Springs is \$415 per week and \$550 per week for a house. With 43% of homes in Alice Springs listed as rentals there is an average 1% vacancy rate at any given time so securing accommodation is a critical part of your move plan.

The median house price in Alice Springs is \$520,000 and the market offers entry level affordable homes through to unique and luxurious prestige estates.
